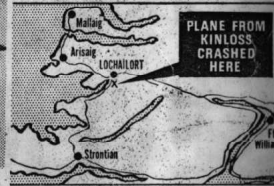
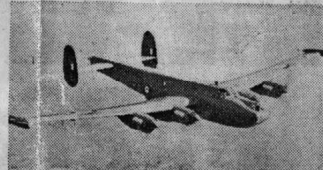

**an I have a joy trip, asked the 13th man**

**THIRTEEN** men died yesterday when their R.A.F. Shackleton plunged nose-first into a hillside in heavy fog.

And the thirteenth man, 21-year-old Pilot Officer Iain Maclean, from Buckie, was on the death flight because he asked for a joy trip.

He had always wanted to be a pilot but was rejected for aircrew because of hay fever. He was given a job behind a desk.

On leave in Buckie, he asked 206 Squadron at Kinloss for a flight. This one, a routine training flight, was the first available.

He was married with a 15-month-old daughter, Denise.

He met his wife Dorothy while he was at Aberdeen University. A former Buckie High School dux he gave up his N.E.A. course to join the R.A.F. He was commissioned last January.

**Ridge**

The ill-fated plane flew into a hill a mile south of the hamlet of Lochallort, near Mallaig, Inverness-shire, just after lunch-time.

Eye-witnesses said its wing-tip clipped a ridge before bursting into flames. Last night four bodies had been found. There were no survivors.

Villagers who rushed to the crash 1000ft. up Ben Nevis found a crater 20ft. wide and 10ft. deep. Debris was scattered over a wide area.

Roadworker Angus Cameron, of School House, Glenfinnan, watched the plane suddenly lose height and plunge behind a foothill.

He said: "I heard the plane come low over the road. The engine was revving at full pitch."

**Married**

"Then there was this explosion, a sheet of orange flame, and wreckage flying all over the place."

Last night the R.A.F. named all the victims and issued pictures of some of them. All were married.

The navigator, Flight-Lieutenant Bruce Mackie, 35, was from Aberdeen. One other Scot was Flying Officer John Young, 31, electronics officer. He had two children.

The captain, Squadron-Leader Michael McCallum, 33, from Fleet, Hampshire, had one child. Shackletons, the R.A.F.'s main submarine hunters, are due to be replaced in 1969 by the Nimrod, a type of Comet.
